Christmas! We celebrate a fact, not a fable... the fact the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, Jesus Christ, became a man in order to lead us to spiritual safety. This fact of our faith is backed up by logic and reason. It would take another man, who was also God, to lead all men to salvation.

Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Palestine, in a poor place, and was placed by His holy Mother in a manger. The night was cold and dark but a brilliant light shown in the darkness and angels appeared, singing: "Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace among men of good will!" (Lk 2:14)

In the nearby fields, shepherds were watching their sheep when an angel invited them to seek the Infant. The shepherds hastened to the stable. Prostrating themselves before Jesus in adoration, they offered Him their gifts. A wondrous star also appeared in the heavens of the East. The Magi saw it and left their distant homes to follow it to Bethlehem. In Bethlehem, the star stood over the place where the Child was. Rejoicing, the Magi entered the house and worshiped the holy Infant. Then, opening their treasures, they offered Him gold, frankincense and myrrh.

It may come as a surprise to learn that the actual date of Christ's birth is unknown. December 25 was chosen by Rome around the year 300 A.D.

In older time, the reason of winter was long, dark and dreary the people knew that at a certain point the sun began to come back, and things changed for the better. So they had a feast to celebrate this fact. Instead of worshipping the Sun-God, people were encouraged to worship Christ, the Son of God. The church saw the coming of Jesus as fulfilling the prophecy of Isaiah: "The people that lived in darkness have seen a great light."

The teaching of Christ was truly a source of light to all who accepted Him. Just as Jesus said: "I am the light of the world", Christ's light was not lit in Bethlehem once and then extinguished. Unlike the Sun, the light of Christ is a persistent light which no darkness can overpower. It shines the midst of devastation, disaster and upheaval.

Christ's light comes as a friend. It brings healing not hurt, life not death. Those who follow Him will always have light of life. He doesn't guarantee that the world will be perfect, but He does supply the grace that we need in order to live like we ought to live...that is grace in the flesh. That is what we need. That is what God offers us in Jesus: the grace of gifts, not gifts earned, but grace that comes to us in our own image and inspires us to live the Christian life.

The life that God's grace makes possible for us is a life in which we, as Christians, operate from a place of compassion and love. It is a life in which we recognize the turmoil and the tragedy, and the deep grief of the neighbors around us and how we can help.

In reflection of this Christmas Season my heart is filled with gratitude for the Savior and I pray that you and your family will be blessed with joy and peace this Christmas. I also want to express my heartfelt gratitude for the role you and your family have played in bringing our Lord's mercy and hope to our parishes during this past year. Your generosity in Christ has been a great blessing during this most challenging year.

May the Lord in His goodness give you a taste of that joy and new heart which the shepherds experienced when the light of God's glory shown around them on that first Christmas night as you journey towards the heavenly Bethlehem, where you and your beloved ones see Him face to face, not as an infant, but in His glory. Amen.
